



What is Hotspots?

Hotspots is a community-based training program which provides landholders and land managers with the skills and knowledge to actively participate in fire management for the protection of life and property while at the same time ensuring biodiversity is protected and maintained.

Hotspots works with a diverse range of communities:

- ✓ New landholders
- ✓ Traditional farming communities
- ✓ Conservation-minded communities
- ✓ Multiple occupancies
- ✓ Indigenous
- ✓ Remote

The training program is delivered by the NSW Rural Fire Service, the Nature Conservation Council and independent facilitators, taking landholders along with agency staff through a number of field days which provide skills and knowledge to actively manage fire.

Hotspots aims to:

- ✓ Provide a forum to share information and knowledge on fire management and fire ecology, to make better informed land management decisions;
- ✓ Build capacity for landholders to do the planning for themselves with the assistance from local fire authorities and other agencies; and
- ✓ Build landholder and community confidence and skills in fire management through planning for and participating in demonstration burns.
